

INTRODUCTION

Education and training institutions were not dominant features of the Church of God in its earliest days. However, the Church quickly came to realize the tremendous importance of ministerial training and Christian higher education. In 1918, the Bible Training School (BTS) was established in Cleveland, Tennessee. Training of the ministers was the focus of BTS, and as such, it laid the foundation for both Lee University and the Pentecostal Theological Seminary.

Since the 1930s, the Church of God has continued to expand Christian higher education and ministerial training around the world. Today, there are more than 263 Bible colleges, universities, and/or educational institutions in various countries. Today, there are more than 40 ministerial training schools in the United States, and there are more than 42 in various countries.

In September 1999, the Church of God Executive Council authorized the establishment of the Division of Education and School of Ministry. Dr. David Ramírez serves as the director and liaison. Dr. Michael L. Baker serves as the chancellor of education. Dr. Michael D. Reynolds serves as the director of Ministerial Development. The Division of Education has two primary responsibilities: (1) ecclesiastical oversight of the educational institutions, and (2) coordination of ministerial development and the continuing education of ministers.

DIVISION OF EDUCATION

Following the 78th Church of God International General Assembly, meeting in San Antonio, Texas, July 25–29, 2022, the Division of Education Board was combined with the Global Board of Education for the 2022–2024 term.

2018 Church of God Minutes Selection (73rd A., 2010), p. 90

I. The General Board of Education shall consist of not less than five members (at least one of whom shall be from outside the United States) [qualified and educationally oriented] who shall be appointed biennially by the International Executive Committee.

II. Duties and Responsibilities

- 1. To stimulate, nurture, and coordinate educational ministries in the Church of God.
- 2. To update and refine the Master Plan of Education at least every five years and to pursue its implementation.
- 3. To assist in the development, standardization, and evaluation of educational institutions at all levels in the Church of God.
- 4. To function in an advisory and consultative capacity to the educational institutions of the Church of God, nationally and internationally, without impinging upon the authority of the boards which control these institutions.
- To meet at least biennially in combined session with the president/directors and board chairmen of each institution of higher education and other educational leaders as appropriate.

III. Institutions of Higher Education

- 1. All Church of God agencies (national, state, and local) which desire to establish an institution of higher education should first secure permission from the International Executive Committee for research, study, and planning of such institution.
- 2. Permission having been obtained, the agency should work with the General Board of Education in the projection of the plans for, and details of, the operation of the new institution.

 The results of the research, when finalized, shall be presented to the International Executive Council for approval, and permission to establish a Bible college or liberal arts college shall be granted by the International Executive Council.

GLOBAL EDUCATION

One of the significant *Commitments* of the church of God states: "We commit ourselves to education as a vital part of all phases of the Spirit-filled Christian life. Education is to be nurtured by the church: locally . . . regionally . . . internationally . . . and globally in every continent of the world" (*Minutes*, 2014 A., Commitments to Our Mission and Vision, p. 40).

Global Education Initiative (GEI)

In 2016, at the 76th International General Assembly, the International Executive Committee took a historic step in authorizing the formation of the *Global Education Initiative*. Its purpose is to assimilate Church of God educational assets for an integrated, comprehensive, and cooperative global educational system. This Initiative provides vision, connectivity, resources, and integration of all educational endeavors globally to focus on maximizing investment in ministers, leaders, and laity.

This Initiative will network educational institutions, strengthen interdependence, maximize partnerships with World Missions and church departments, created a comprehensive team of educational leaders globally, and engage, rethink, revise, and contextualize our education commitment for relevant, 21st -century ministry.

The Global Education Initiative operational strategy includes three components:

- Short-term educational experiences, with or without credit.
- Ministry development, leading to credentialing.
- Seminary higher education learning

Each of these formats is available through either traditional educational models or online learning.

Division of Education (DOE)

The Church of God Division of Education is comprised of all COG educational agencies, institutions, and programs around the world that are predicated upon a biblical and theological foundation as set forth in the Declaration of Faith and the stated core Education Commitment of the Church of God. Its objective is to make available certified educational opportunities to individuals through a coordinated global system. The DOE system includes the following: more than 263educational institutions globally (universities, seminaries, colleges, Bible Institutes, and more); ministerial preparation; licensure materials; leadership development through the Calling And Ministry Studies (CAMS), Ministerial Internship Program (MIP), School of Ministry (SOM), USA Hispanic Educational Ministries (USAHEM), MOBILIZE—a program for laity; and the DOE1 platform—an online eLearning platform that combines cutting-edge technology and advanced instructional design—as well as an overall commitment to our Global Education Initiative.

Lee University

Lee University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). Lee is a Christian institution which offers liberal arts and professional education on both the baccalaureate and graduate levels through both residential and distance programs. It seeks to provide education that integrates biblical truth as revealed in the Holy Scriptures with truth discovered through the study of arts and sciences and in the practice of various professions.

A personal commitment to Jesus Christ as Savior is the controlling perspective from which the educational enterprise is carried out. The foundational purpose of all educational programs is to develop within the students a knowledge, appreciation, understanding, ability, and skills which will prepare them for responsible Christian living in a complex world.

Pentecostal Theological Seminary (PTS)

The Pentecostal Theological Seminary is a fully accredited graduate school with a Wesleyan-Pentecostal perspective, dedicated to

preparing pastors, counselors, chaplains, and ministry leaders for global evangelization and Kingdom impact. The Seminary is accessible via its traditional campus in Cleveland, TN, or extensive online distance education opportunities, J-terms, cohorts, and PTS connectivity with educational institutions around the world. Graduate degrees include the following: Theological Studies, Church Ministries, Counseling, Clinical Mental Health Counseling, Discipleship and Christian Formation, Chaplaincy, and other areas of concentration.

PTS also provides a certificate program to equip laity and ministers who are actively serving in ministry. The Certificate of Wesleyan-Pentecostal Ministry (CWPM) is a certified master's degree at PTS. It serves as a leveling program for those who desire to expand their theological education but have not yet completed a bachelor's degree.

School of Ministry (SOM)

The School of Ministry is an undergraduate educational program designed to serve ministers and laity who have a strong desire to prepare for ministry within the church and larger community. The SOM includes courses of study in Bible, doctrine, and pastoral ministry. All course work may be taken for SOM credits or personal enrichment via the Internet, DVD series, Distance Learning Centers (DLCs), and seminars.

How Do I Get Involved?

There is a place of engagement connection for everyone committed to ministry. For the minister, church leader, or laity, there are opportunities for personal ministerial growth, development, and enrichment. CHURCH OF GOD MASTER PLAN OF EDUCATION

The Church of God acknowledges, as part of the Great Commission, its responsibility to provide educational opportunities for its constituency. The programs of education are predicated upon the biblical and theological foundation set forth in the Declaration of Faith.

The church is committed to obedience of the mandate of the Great Commission to make disciples of all nations and to its Declaration of Faith as the theological foundation of all its educational endeavors. It views purposeful education as a lifelong quest for truth, which will help the learner become aware of God's self-disclosure in the Word and in the world, to the end that the individual may develop mentally and spiritually, relate meaningfully to others, fulfill Christian discipleship, and enjoy useful occupation. The ultimate aim of education is to develop a mature individual rightly related to God, to self, and to others.

Primary responsibility for the coordinating of all educational programs rests with the Global Board of Education, authorized by the International General Assembly and appointed biennially by the International, national, regional, territorial, state, and local levels.

Educational Purposes

Church of God educational agencies, institutions, and programs are committed to the following purposes:

- 1. To impart knowledge about God as He is revealed in the Bible and in creation.
- To aid in personal development which will lead to healthy
 physical, mental, and spiritual growth; to provide a framework in which the meaning of life and individual roles in
 the church and society can be understood; and to encourage ethical relationships in accordance with biblical principles.
- To lead to an appreciation of biblical faith and practice as understood by the Church of God, to inspire wholehearted acceptance of its principles, and to encourage a living expression of its precepts.

Church of God Master Plan of Education

- 4. To prepare for successful vocational pursuits and effective Christian service.
- 5. To train in biblical knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary for ministry.
- 6. To network ministerial training and ministerial placement with denominational leaders and local churches.

Educational Objectives

The Church of God proposes to fulfill the purposes stated above by committing itself to the following educational objectives:

- To make multilevel educational opportunities available to interested individuals through a coordinated international system, taking into consideration the uniqueness of individuals, national and cultural distinctives, age-group differences, and varying needs and goals.
- 2. To become involved in various levels of educational endeavors, including homeschooling, childcare and kindergarten programs, private local church elementary and secondary schools, Bible institutes, Bible colleges, undergraduate liberal arts colleges, continuing education, distance learning, in-service training, and graduate-level professional programs.
- 3. To give highest educational priority to the preparation of clergy and laity for effective Christian ministry.
- 4. To place emphasis on the centrality of the Bible and the Christian worldview in the curriculum at all levels.
- 5. To fulfill the mandate for discipleship as stated in the Great Commission given by Christ.
- 6. To provide education in the arts and sciences and programs of vocational preparations.
- 7. To ensure excellence in all programs of education by encouraging our educational institutions to meet appropriate accreditation standards, where such standards are not in conflict with the Church of God philosophy of education.
- 8. To teach love for and loyalty to the Church of God by understanding the values and importance of its history, doctrine, government, and practical commitments.

As educational efforts in the Church of God became increasingly diverse, the Executive Council in 1998 decided that the demands of the twenty-first century made it prudent for the Church to combine the various educational entities under a single structure, thus forming the Division of Education. The Division has oversight of programs, expansion, and development of colleges, seminaries, universities, Bible Institutes, and ministerial training models throughout the international Church of God.

The twenty-first century poses drastic new challenges for the Church of God and its outreach at home and abroad. With the imminent coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, these challenges must be met with adequately trained ministers and laity. The ill-prepared steward will not be well-equipped to reap the harvest. Traditional educational efforts are enhanced by emerging twenty-first-century technology to enable the Church to train workers for the harvest. It is the goal of the Division of Education to significantly contribute traditional and nontraditional delivery systems needed for education, training, and preparation worldwide through the six units within the Division.

The Division of Education consists of six units: (1) USA Educational System, (2) Ministerial Development/School of Ministry, (3) Hispanic Educational System, (4) International Educational System, (5) MOBILIZE, and (6) DOE1.

As colleges and seminaries were developed by the Church, the vast majority of ministers still were unable to take advantage of the excellent training available through these schools. Thus, the Division of Education was brought into being, not only to coordinate and give oversight to existing schools, but also to expand and accelerate educational offerings available to the ministers who are unable to attend college or seminary. The mission of the School of Ministry is to provide training for every minister. This training is affordable for every minister's income; it is accessible for every minister's location; and it is relevant for every minister's educational level. Recalling the vision that gave birth to the original Bible Training School and correspondence courses, the School of Ministry is bringing to every Church of God minister training opportunities that focus exclusively on ministerial preparation.

OVERVIEW DIVISION OF EDUCATION MINISTRIES

Under the ecclesiastical oversight of the General Education Board and administration of the Liaison and Chancellor, the Division of Education fulfills two major responsibilities: (1) The advancement of postsecondary education, and (2) The supervision of ministerial development.

POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION

Since the beginning of the Church of God Bible Training School (BTS) in 1918, education and Bible training have been vital ingredients in the phenomenal growth of a small group of Appalachian Mountain worshipers into one of the world's largest Pentecostal denominations.

But even though it has developed a splendid academic program, the church has never left the emphasis on grassroots Bible training for laity and ministers. This twofold emphasis was initiated in BTS with the development of both a campus program and correspondence courses that could be taken in distant cities, states, and countries.

With continued growth but constant biblical emphasis, BTS, now known as Lee University, is one of the premier educational institutions in the United States. Serving as the flagship school of the church's more than 265 educational institutions of higher learning throughout the world, Lee University sets the standard for the certification of postsecondary schools in the denomination's Division of Education.

The Division of Education (DOE) recognizes Church of God postsecondary institutions at one of four levels—Level I, Christian Service Schools; Level II, Bible Institutes; Level III, Degree-Granting Institutions; and Level IV, Graduate Degree-Granting Institutions.

To receive Division of Education certification, an institution must make application to the DOE, complete a status report, which is based on eight standards and related criteria, host a visiting site committee—if it is a degree-granting institution—and be approved by the Standing Committee on Certification.

Along with Lee University in Cleveland, Tennessee, Levels III and IV certified schools include:

- The Pentecostal Theological Seminary (PTS, Cleveland, Tennessee) in the United States;
- Seminario Ministerial Sudamericano (SEMISUD, Ecuador), Seminario Bíblico Pentecostal de Centroamérica (SEBIPCA, Guatemala), Seminario Bíblico Méxicano (SEBIME, Mexico), and Seminario Evangélico de Igreja de Deus (SEID, Brazil) in Latin America;
- Universidad Teológica del Caribe (UTC, Puerto Rico), Bethel Bible College (Jamaica), and Seminaire Theologique de l'Eglise de Dieu (Haiti) in the Caribbean;
- European Theological Seminary (ETS, Germany), Institutul Teologic Penticostal (Romania), Eurasian Theological Seminary (Russia), and Gilgal Biblical Seminary (United Arab Emirates) in **Europe/Middle East**;
- Full Gospel Church of God College (South Africa), Bethel Bible College (Zambia), and Discipleship College (Kenya) in Africa; and
- Asian Seminary of Christian Ministries (ASCM, Philippines), Mt. Zion Bible College (India), and Bethel Theological Seminary (Indonesia) in Asia.

ALEAL is the Alliance for Latin American Education (Alianza para Educación Latina)—a coalition of schools for ministerial preparation that coordinates the offering of graduate degrees in ministry subjects throughout Latin America. At present, master's degrees are awarded in Mexico, Guatemala, Brazil, Puerto Rico, and Ecuador, and the doctorate (Ph.D.) may be earned in Ecuador.

FIEL is the International Fraternity of Educators and Leaders (Fraternidad Internacional de Educadores y Lideres)—an organization of Hispanic Church of God leaders and educators who explore, discuss, and implement growth in the theological education of Hispanic Church of God ministerial students. FIEL hosts a meeting every two years to fulfill these purposes. FIEL USA exists and functions under the director of USA Hispanic Educational Ministries.

The French Language Action Committee (Comité Pour la Traduction Envers la Francophonie) has been organized to translate ministerial training materials into the French language. The ultimate goal of the group is to develop a curriculum for the French language Bible schools around the world.

MINISTERIAL DEVELOPMENT

A second major responsibility of the Division of Education is developing and implementing ministerial training programs for ministers seeking credentials with the Church of God and offering continuing education for pastors and laity.

While attendance at the denomination's campus-based schools continues to increase, the church understands the necessity of also providing a variety of continuing education programs. These programs train and develop called ministers and key lay leaders who do not have the opportunity to enroll in campus programs.

Calling And Ministry Studies (CAMS)

CAMS is a three-month program prior to licensing, which introduces prospective ministers to the work of the ministry. The potential candidate learns about the meaning of the calling to ministry and is led through a study of the practices of ministry, as well as the history and polity of the Church of God.

Ministerial Internship Program (MIP)

Since the MIP was authorized in 1978, it has been the major source in the United States for ministerial training to support the licensure process and preparation for ordination. The MIP emphasizes an education component which gives ministers an introduction to biblical content, doctrine, and the ministerial practices. The MIP also provides a nine-month experiential learning component by pairing each candidate with an experienced minister who will provide learning opportunities in a real-life context. The MIP

has been used in more than 80 countries around the world and continues to be a vital ministerial training program.

School of Ministry (SOM) and the Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS)

The SOM is responsible for the creation and management of the CIMS curriculum for ministerial education. The SOM produced CIMS by using the expertise of more than seventy Church of God pastors, leaders, and professors. These twenty courses offer the church a uniform curriculum for the education of ministers in biblical, doctrinal, and ministerial studies. CIMS has enrolled more than 20,141 students in CIMS courses for credit. The Church of God has endorsed the value of the CIMS courses for lifelong ministerial training.

Online Education

The explosive growth of online education around the world has given the Church of God multiple opportunities to train ministers. In the future, this avenue of education will become increasingly utilized to develop new generations of ministers. Web-based Internet offerings using new education technology are available from Church of God universities and seminaries.

• Lee University

The Division of Adult Learning (DAL) is providing Internet and individual study programs which lead to degrees. The focus is on Bible study, Christian education, leadership, pastoral ministry, and theology. Some degrees may be earned entirely online.

• Pentecostal Theological Seminary

The Pentecostal Theological Seminary now offers completely online the following accredited graduate degrees: Theological Studies, Church Ministries, Counseling, Clinical Mental Health Counseling, and Discipleship and Christian Formation.

• Seminario Ministerial Sudamericano (SEMISUD)

Based in Quito, Ecuador, SEMISUD offers online courses in Spanish. The Division of Education supplied the funds to acquire the essential equipment to initiate the program. The classes combine School of Ministry courses with SEMISUD courses to offer distance learning opportunities on the Internet for Spanish language students.

USA Hispanic Educational Ministries (USA HEM)

The USA Hispanic Educational Ministries (USA HEM) directs, facilitates, and coordinates a cooperative platform of educational opportunities for the Church of God Hispanic constituency in the USA and Canada. For more than 65 years, Hispanic education has followed the mission to provide practical training for leaders who will reach the harvest. Presently, with the partnership of the eight USA Hispanic regional administrations and also with Hispanic outreach groups under Anglo state/regional administrations, USA HEM directs and supervises Hispanic Bible Institutes (HBI) and other ministerial training opportunities. During 2020–2022, some 1,626 students were enrolled in 142 Institutes, and more than 637 students finished the Certificate in Christian Ministries, CAMS, and CIMS.

The USA HEM also partners with other educational institutions to create higher education opportunities such as the bachelor's degree in ministerial leadership *en Español* (through the Pentecostal Theological Seminary). Presently, USA HEM is in the process of designing a continuing education program for HBI teachers to enhance professional competencies in the field of education.

Mobilize

Mobilize is a one-year program, under the guidance of a local pastor, for training congregational lay leaders for specialized local church ministries. Mobilize has been implemented in the United States and in several international settings. Mobilize is the former Lay Leadership Development (LLD) program, which was renamed and upgraded in 2013. Today, Mobilize has expanded to include the following programs: (1) Mobilize Learner—a program for new converts or a refresher of the Declaration of Faith of the Church of God in the form of a Pentecostal Catechism and workbook; (2) Mobilize Worker—a program for the laity who want to work in the church, but not necessarily in a leadership position; (3) Mobilize Local Leadership Development (LLD)—a program for laity who want to be in a leadership position; and (4) Lay Certification—a program where the laity leaders are set forth by the pastor and local church with laity certification.

Ministerial Background Checks and Licensure Support

The licensing process leading to a Church of God ministerial credential begins with a background check as authorized by the International Executive Committee, and supervision of the administrative bishops. The states and regions are provided forms, examinations, and study materials related to all ministry ranks—Exhorter, Ordained Minister, Ordained Bishop, Minister of Music, Minister of Christian Education, and Lay Minister.

VISION AND DIRECTION

The future vision and direction of the Division of Education is as follows:

- 1. **Research.** A goal is to continue research programs that provide vital information which the Church needs in order to encourage ministerial training.
- 2. Expansion of the School of Ministry courses (CIMS curriculum). Future expansion to CIMS offerings will include courses related to additional ministries (e.g. youth ministry, missionary ministries, women's ministries, etc.).
- 3. **Expansion of online offerings.** The growth and development of Church of God web-based education will include the expansion of the degree offerings—for ministries and laity and for Church of God members and nonmembers.
- 4. **DOE1.** DOE1 is a learning platform of continuing education for ministers, which consists of ten, six-minute classes on various ministerial themes, such as finances, taxes, insurance, family-oriented classes, biblical classes, pastoral classes, etc.

CONCLUSION

The Division of Education serves the broad educational needs of the Church of God. While each institution maintains its own identity, only the Division of Education recognizes and serves the educational needs of all the educational institutions and ministers of the Church of God, functioning exclusively for these purposes.

Denominational Certification of Institutions



OVERVIEW INSTITUTIONAL STANDARDS AND CRITERIA FOR DENOMINATIONAL CERTIFICATION

Introduction

The creation and establishment of the Institutional Standards and Criteria for Denominational Certification is a result of the combined efforts of the Division of Education and the General Board of Education with endorsement by the Church of God International Executive Committee and the World Missions Board.

In addition, the Standing Committee on Certification authorized by the Global Board of Education serves faithfully to respond to the individual status reports from institutions requesting denominational certification and participates in site visits when needed.

Implementation

The Church of God set forth the educational objectives in a Master Plan of Education, and these objectives are regularly published in the *Education Handbook*. In response to a need for increased standardization in the educational institutions of the Church of God, in 2002 a plan was presented to the General Board to create four levels of institutions. Each of the four levels was assigned standards appropriate to the complexity of the institution's mission, with evaluative criteria for each standard. When

the Board approved the program, it was titled *Church of God Institutional Standards and Criteria for Denominational Certification*. These standards and criteria are approved by the International Executive Committee and the World Missions Board.

Articles 2 and 7 of the educational objectives of the Master Plan of Education state that the church will engage in various levels of educational endeavor and that the goal of the educational objectives is "to ensure excellence in all programs by endeavoring to meet appropriate accreditation standards, where such standards are not in conflict with the Church of God philosophy of education." The goal is to assist each institution in its development and progress toward appropriate regional or national accreditation, and so publish a list of educational institutions which are certified by the denomination at a given educational level. After proper notice and publication of the educational standards and criteria, the Division of Education proceeded with the implementation of a program of institutional evaluation.

Purpose of Institutional Evaluation

The purpose of denominational certification is to ensure that an institution is approved by the Division of Education as a Church of God school in keeping with the doctrine and polity of the Church of God and is certified by the denomination to function as a Level I, II, III, or IV institution. Denominational certification reflects credibility in the Church of God, but it does not replace the need for approval by the appropriate governmental authority and accreditation by relevant accrediting agencies.

The Division of Education views the certification process as developmental. Conformity to the Standards and Criteria for Denominational Certification results in either (1) candidacy status of an institution at an educational level, or (2) denominational certification of an institution by the Church at a designated educational level. The standards and criteria are essentially minimal models for excellence and a beginning point for institutional growth and maturity.

Evaluation Process

Supervised by the Division of Education, the evaluation process is essentially a peer-evaluation procedure conducted by a

visiting committee appointed by the Division of Education. The evaluative experience serves a dual purpose: (1)To decide whether the institution should be certified at the level requested, and (2) To identify the strengths and weaknesses of the institution and how they influence the school's ability to perform its educational mission. A Standing Committee on Certification authorized by the Global Board of Education receives completed institutional status reports and visiting committee reports that are submitted to the Division of Education and makes recommendations regarding the certification of the institution.

An evaluative procedure was developed for four levels of institutions, with the cultural and national context of each institution considered in the evaluative process. The process of evaluation is not designed just to give an institution a grade for past performance but to serve as a resource for future development by having the institution become increasingly adept at measuring educational outcomes and institutional effectiveness.

The number of individuals serving on a visiting committee will be determined by the size and complexity of the educational offerings of the institution. An institution may apply for a financial grant from the Division of Education to help defray the expenses associated with a committee visit. If the applying institution is an institution requesting a substantive change in its educational mission or is a new educational institution requesting initial approval, no action will be taken by the Division of Education until the Board, which administers the source of funding, has approved the substantive changes in the institution or the start-up of the new institution.

After a visiting committee has performed its evaluation of an institution, the visiting committee chair will submit its findings to the Division of Education for review by the Standing Committee on Certification. The recommendations of the visiting committee and the Standing Committee on Certification will then be shared with the institution. The visiting committee and Standing Committee on Certification will not share their findings with anyone except those specified in the Division of Education.

With regard to certification, the Standing Committee on Certification has several choices:

- 1. It can give certification at the requested level.
- 2. It can give candidacy for certification at the requested level.
- 3. It can give certification or candidacy for certification at a lower level than the requested level, provided the chief executive officer of the institution makes such change request by letter to the director.
- 4. It can delay certification and candidacy and make suggestions for development of the institution in considering future request for certification.
- 5. It can award certification based on the institution's having achieved accreditation by a recognized regional or international accrediting agency.

Normally, an institution will need at least two years to work on moving from candidacy to certification. The procedure is to file a request for a committee visit and evaluation process. The same procedure will be followed by the institution's process. The same procedure will be followed by institutions desiring substantive change to move to a higher level of certification and by beginning institutions.

After receiving certification at a given level, an institution will submit a report using a format provided by the Division of Education after five years. Further, a reaffirmation visit will take place after ten years, unless waived by the Division of Education. Any substantive change will also require a written explanation.

The Committee on Certification can grant the following four levels of response:

1. Reaffirmation without reservations/suggestions.

The Committee on Certification determines there are no significant changes necessary for the continuance of this educational institution at the previous level granted.

2. Reaffirmation with reservations.

- A. The Committee on Certification determines there are significant concerns that may affect the educational institution negatively if not properly addressed.
- B. The Committee will inform the institution of the areas it deems deficient, asking the institution to provide a written response on actions regarding the reservation(s) within 18 months.

3. Reaffirmation with suggestions.

The Committee on Certification determines there are areas of concern that may need to be considered in the future. However, these areas are deemed relatively minor at the moment and are offered to the institution as a recommendation for their consideration. These suggestions do not require a response or follow-up action.

4. Denial of reaffirmation.

The Committee on Certification determines that the institution has declined from the level of certification previously granted by the Church of God and therefore is not granted reaffirmation at that level. Recommendations or suggestions are not offered, because the institution will need to reapply for affirmation.

Evaluation Procedure

The director of Ministerial Development will, in cooperation with the leadership of the institution, select a date for a committee visit to an institution, and appoint a committee to visit the institution. Selection of each visiting committee member will be based on one's educational background, area of expertise, experience, knowledge of the evaluative process, and compatibility with the educational mission of the institution. Committee members will be assigned one or more standards and criteria to evaluate. After reviewing various aspects of the school's performance, members will report their findings to the committee in session at the site of the visit.

LEVELS OF CERTIFICATION

Level I

Christian Service School

A Christian Service School is an institution designed to offer basic Christian service training to ministers and laity. The school may function in a local church under the guidance of the pastor or one whom he appoints.

Level II

Bible Institute

A Bible Institute offers postsecondary or college-level education and training to individuals preparing for Christian ministry. The education focuses on extensive biblical knowledge, combined with a training emphasis on practical application. The institute functions under the auspices of the denomination upon recommendation of the Division of Education.

Level III

Degree-Granting Institution

A degree-granting institution is one which offers college-level programs of study leading to a baccalaureate degree or its equivalent. This normally requires 120 semester credits with a general education core and a major area of study or its equivalent in the context of each respective institution.

Level IV

Graduate Degree-Granting Institution

A graduate degree-granting institution is a college, seminary, or university, offering postgraduate degrees. If an institution hosts a graduate program from another institution, this alone does not meet the criteria for a Level IV certification.

When an institution offers a master's degree program, it may be certified only when 100 percent of the resident faculty members teaching at the master's level have appropriate academic credentials.

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THE DIVISION OF EDUCATION AND CERTIFICATE IN MINISTERIAL STUDIES

While it has placed high value on education from its earliest days, the Church of God also recognizes that many God-called men and women do not have the opportunity to attend college or seminary. In order to serve those individuals, the Church of God Division of Education established the School of Ministry, a nontraditional educational initiative which offers a college-level course of study leading to the Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS).

The vision of the Church of God is to have a ministerial training program that is like a "seamless robe" which covers the needs of all applicants in a manner that prepares them to be "lifelong learners." This vision was amplified at the 2014 International General Assembly when the church adopted the following amendment to its *Commitments to Our Mission and Vision*.

We commit ourselves to education as a vital part of all phases of the Spirit-filled Christian life. Education is to be nurtured by the church: locally in rural areas, towns, and cities; regionally in counties, states, and geographical regions; internationally in every country with a Church of God presence; and globally on every continent of the world. We will demonstrate our commitment by . . .

- Developing and fostering means of self-education with access to educational resources.
- Recognizing local-church institutions which provide education in church and/or school formats.
- Affirming in public places those who minister in education.
- Sponsoring educational institutions of higher learning to equip laity, ministers, institutions, and ministries.
- Providing curriculum and materials which affirm the doctrines, practices, mission, vision, and commitments of the Church of God.

In order to ensure the highest level of academic excellence and practical application for ministry in today's context, the Division of Education commissioned eighty experienced teachers,

preachers, and administrators who were academically and practically qualified (sixty-six with doctorate degrees) to compose and video-record 490 lectures for CIMS. The program now is used to train ministers in several different languages around the world. The contributing faculty members are listed on the following page.

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THE DIVISION OF EDUCATION AND MINISTERIAL DEVELOPMENT/ SCHOOL OF MINISTRY

Recognizing that all believers are part of God's "royal priest-hood" (1 Peter 2:9), the Church of God holds firmly to the tenet that every believer is called to ministry in the truest sense of the biblical word *diakonos* (Romans 12:7). But while some ministers are called to "serve tables" (*diakoneo*, Acts 6:2), others are called to the "ministry of the Word" *diakonia*, Acts 6:4). The Division of Education assists pastors to mentor and train servant leaders in the local church through *Mobilize*, its Local Leadership Development program. The Division assists those who are called as ministers of the Word through its Ministerial Development/School of Ministry (MDSOM).

As a Pentecostal denomination, the Church of God seeks to affirm those ministers who are much like Peter, the self-educated fisherman from Galilee, as diligently as the affirmation given to those who are more like Paul, the brilliantly trained student who studied in Jerusalem "at the feet of Gamaliel" (Acts 5:34; 22:3). Regardless of the background of those who are called, the Church of God carefully examines all applicants for credentialed ministry in order to ensure sound doctrine, spiritual integrity, and the highest example of righteous living.

Through MDSOM, the Division of Education assists in the ministerial credentialing process by providing support services for the International Executive Committee and state/ regional overseers. It is through these elected and appointed church leaders that credentialed ministers, who have been "set forth" by their respective local churches, are officially recognized by the denomination as exhorters, ordained ministers, and ordained bishops.

In the organizational structure of the Church of God in the United States and Canada, educational goals are the purview of the state/regional overseer, who appoints the State Board of Ministerial Development for their implementation and supervision (*Minutes*, 2012, pp. 106, 107). The primary programs that are directed by the Board, under the oversight of the administrative bishop,

are Calling And Ministry Studies (CAMS), Ministerial Internship Program (MIP), Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS), and Distance Learning Centers (DLCs).

From this perspective, each state/regional office functions educationally as a Level II Bible Institute, with the state/regional overseer serving as the director and the Board of Ministerial Development serving as the Board of Directors. The Division of Education has adopted standards and criteria for these programs which enable qualified students to receive appropriate course credits at Lee University and the Pentecostal Theological Seminary upon their official acceptance into the institution's academic program.

The USA Hispanic Educational Ministries (USA HEM) directs, facilitates, and coordinates a cooperative platform of educational opportunities for the Church of God Hispanic constituency in the USA and Canada. For more than 65 years, Hispanic education has followed the mission to provide practical training for leaders who will reach the harvest among one of the most relevant priorities with the partnership of the nine USA Hispanic regional administrations and also Hispanic outreach groups under Anglo state/regional administrations USA HEM LEADS and supervises Hispanic Bible Institutes (HBI) and other ministerial training opportunities. During 2022, 1,662 students were enrolled in 142 Institutes.

The USA HEM also partners with other educational institutions to create higher education opportunities such as the Bachelor's degree in Ministerial Leadership *en Español* (through Lee University's Division of Adult Leaning) and the Master's degree in Latino Studies (through the Pentecostal Theological Seminary). Presently USA HEM is in the process of designing a continuing education program for HBI teachers to enhance professional competencies in the field of education.

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND TRAINING PROGRAMS

In the many countries where the Church of God has a presence, it has been observed that ministerial effectiveness may be measured in direct proportion to the availability of training. If education is neglected, evangelism and church growth languish.

The church has attempted to institute residential and extension programs of training in each country—multiple institutions in some more mature fields—and, in addition, to establish advanced schools in each of the five geographic regions into which the church outside the United States is organized administratively.

Among the outstanding schools are the following:

Additional schools are continuing to advance toward the Level III and Level IV certification levels. Some 118 schools presently are training students for the ministry.

INTERNATIONAL MINISTERIAL TRAINING Overview

The state of ministerial training in the International Church of God varies widely. In some nations or regions, there is virtually no quality training available. In other areas, there is a wide variety of programs, opportunities, and educational institutions for new ministers to gain knowledge and for experienced ministers to continue their development. There is a growing need to improve the ministerial training processes of the Church of God. Dr. Roland Vaughan (director of World Missions: 1996–2000; 2004–2008) expressed the relationship between training and ministerial success in these terms: "Where ministerial education flourishes, the Church flourishes; where education ceases, evangelism ceases. Wherever the Church of God starts a Bible school or training program, like ripples in a pond, the church grows in circles from that base."

The International Church of God has developed many different forms of ministerial training. One of these methods is through the excellent system of educational institutions—Church of God Bible colleges, institutes, and universities around the world. The leaders of the various nations or regions have also created indigenous programs for the training of their ministers. However, World Missions leaders have often expressed the need for additional training for their ministers. Also, they have consistently requested "standardization" for ministerial training and credentialing processes, and for these programs to be available for every national or regional jurisdiction.

To respond to this urgent plea, World Missions leaders and Division of Education leaders have partnered to develop an international plan that will address this need. First, in 2008, a survey was conducted by email and postal mail, asking every International Church of God leader three important questions: (1) How do you train your ministers? (2) What is your ministerial licensing process? (3) What educational opportunities are available for your ministers?

Second, the information that was collected was analyzed in 2009 to identify strengths and weaknesses in ministerial training and ministerial licensure. A copy of the survey and analysis is available from Ministerial Development/School of Ministry.

Third, a meeting of World Missions leaders and Division of Education leaders was called for January 13, 2010, to discuss the results of the International Ministerial Training Survey.

One of the most frequent responses to the survey was a call for a "universal core curriculum" for every new Church of God minister to complete. Because of this expressed need, a smaller committee (Bill George, Lynn Stone, Dwain Pyeatt, Larry Hess, and David Ramírez) was appointed by Dr. Doug LeRoy to create a list of required or suggested courses. Before this committee met, Dr. Bill George surveyed several respected educational leaders and World Missions leaders to elicit opinions for this list. From this information, the committee met on May 17, 2010, to choose a recommended core curriculum to serve as a foundation for international ministerial training.

All the recommended subject areas correlate with a specific Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS) course.

The Church of God has endorsed the Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS) curriculum to serve as a global ministerial training curriculum.

Resolution From the International Executive Council to the International General Council

NOTE: This resolution was reported to the 2008 meeting of the International General Council of the Church of God, and is recorded on page 53 of the *Journal of the 72nd Church of God International General Assembly.*

18. CORE VALUE: LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT Division of Education Standard Curriculum (International)

A. Report:

The International Executive Council has adopted the following resolution in regard to training for ministerial development:

WHEREAS ministerial education is important to the preparation of twenty-first century ministers; and

WHEREAS the future of the church depends on the quality, commitment, and anointing of its ministry; and

WHEREAS the first 20 courses of the curriculum cover many of the vital topics in areas of biblical content, Church of God history and doctrine, and practical pastoral studies; and

WHEREAS the curriculum has been widely used in the Church of God in the United States of America and internationally, and

WHEREAS the curriculum content has been carefully appraised and vetted since the program was initiated in 1998; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS) serve as a Global Ministerial Training Curriculum for the Church of God.

In partnership with World Missions, the Division of Education is preparing an international plan for ministerial training, considering such issues as contextualization, basic education, deficiencies, translation needs, cultural barriers, and funding shortages. This plan will include different elements of ministerial training available now, such as institutions, indigenous programs, and MD-SOM programs, and will rely on cooperation between these elements so that national and regional administrations can improve ministerial training in each nation/region.

To respond to the need for ministerial training programs, Ministerial Development/ School of Ministry (MDSOM) has prepared the following programs to be shared with the International

Church of God: (1) The Ministerial Internship Program (MIP), (2) Calling And Ministry Studies (CAMS), (3) Mobilize, and (4) Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS). These programs are often facilitated in a noninstitutional setting, through ministers meetings and extension classes. Yet, because of their excellent academic qualities, these programs also may be offered under the guidance of an educational institution. Often, the person who serves as the national education director is the same person who directs the institution. Or, in less developed nations or regions that do not possess an educational institution, the national overseer administers all ministerial training, and is listed as the MDSOM coordinator.

The Ministerial Internship Program (MIP) has been introduced to many nations over the past three decades. This platform of structured mentoring, locally taught seminars, and academic courses is focused on training individuals for full-time ministry.

Calling And Ministry Studies (CAMS) helps the candidates assess their own personal calling and understand true biblical ministry, and helps the church assess their suitability for credentials in the Church of God. The international use of CAMS is rapidly expanding.

Mobilize Local Leadership Development (LLD) is a program that assists the local church pastor in training lay leaders in a local congregation. Through Mobilize, pastors can effectively and efficiently mentor church leaders into successful ministry roles that help the church grow. It also establishes a bond of loyalty and a relationship of cooperation between the pastor and members. It is a pastor's tool for motivating and training members for spiritual leadership and ministry together.

The Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS) courses have been internationally distributed during the last decade, and have proven to be very useful ministerial training tools. The CIMS program consists of a curriculum of 20 courses taught on video by Church of God pastors, professors, and preachers. Textbooks and study guides are coordinated with the video lessons. The courses are divided into biblical studies, which focus on forms of ministry such as preaching, benevolence, counseling, music, and church planting. These courses are suitable for "in-the-field" ministerial training, or for use as college classroom curriculum. The CIMS

courses have been translated into 18 different languages, and are used in at least 46 nations and regions.

CIMS has been recognized as vitally important in international ministerial training, as evidenced in the following listings of schools using the CIMS curriculum.

- 1. CIMS materials (DVDs and/or textbooks and study guides) have been translated into Spanish, French, German, Serbian, Russian, Hindi, Chinese, Italian, Arabic, Portuguese, and six African languages. Translation projects continue at an increasing pace.
- 2. CIMS courses are taught in Distance Learning Centers in 20 African countries.
- 3. Six thousand CIMS textbooks and study guides in Spanish have been printed in Lima, Perú, and shipped to Quito, Ecuador, for use in the distance learning program of South American Seminary (SEMISUD). Readings of CIMS textbooks are broadcast by radio to remote locations in Ecuador.
- 4. Discipleship College in Kenya offers CIMS courses as the first year of the three-year Bachelor of Theology degree.
- 5. South Africa has incorporated CIMS courses into their distance education curriculum.
- 6. The Bible School in Malawi uses CIMS courses in their curriculum.
- 7. The Bible schools in Lusaka, Mufulira, and Zambia, have incorporated CIMS courses into their curriculum.
- 8. The Church of God in Cuba has no Bible school, so the leaders have chosen CIMS courses to train their ministers. In 2007, the leadership received CIMS materials, and they have printed thousands of textbooks and study guides for their ministers.
- 9. The United Kingdom has adopted the CIMS program as their ministerial training curriculum and developed an extensive integrated training program incorporating CIMS, MIP licensure studies, and special training seminars.

- 10. Serbia-Montenegro-Macedonia is using CIMS to train new ministers. These courses have been translated, along with the ministerial exams and study manuals.
- 11. The Church of God in the Philippines has enrolled hundreds of CIMS students.
- 12. The U.S.A. Hispanic Institutes have adopted CIMS to supplement their curriculum.
- 13. European Theological Seminary (ETS) is using the CIMS courses to supplement curriculum.
- 14. CIMS in Europe is promoted through ETS and through the Office of the Field Director.
- 15. Ethiopia uses CIMS courses under the auspices of both Bible Institutes.

The state of ministerial licensure in the International Church of God displays some of the same widely varying characteristics as does ministerial training. In some areas, there is an inconsistency of standards and processes, an intermittent nature to licensing opportunities, and a shortage of proper preparation of materials. The Division of Education is not directly responsible for the licensing process; the overseer of each nation or region holds the authority over the manner and frequency of licensure opportunities. However, the Division of Education is responsible for the preparation of study manuals and exams.

Thus, the Division of Education seeks to encourage national overseers in the improvement of licensure processes, and regularly upgrades the licensure materials. Another way the Division of Education assists in the credentialing process is by encouraging national overseers to use educational and training programs as requirements for advancement in licensure, and advocating that national overseers connect the licensure process with the educational and training opportunities available. When the international ministerial training plan is instituted, and the level of ministerial training in the International Church of God is improved, then hopefully the licensure processes will be simultaneously improved in those nations or regions.

The Church of God with International Offices in Cleveland, Tennessee, operates in 181 countries around the world. Since 1976, the Church of God has bestowed the Distinguished Educators Award to recipients who have made a unique contribution to education in the Church of God somewhere in the world. The award is presented biennially at the Church of God Educators Seminar during the denomination's International General Assembly.

In 1996, the General Board of Education expanded the award to two recipients. One award represents a faculty educator and the other award is designated as a leadership administration award.

The recipients of these awards are selected from a list of nominees submitted by church officials, national and territorial leaders from around the world, faculty, and administration from all educational institutions internationally, missionary educators, and ministerial development board members internationally.

Special appreciation is expressed from the General Board of Education to Dr. M. Dwain Pyeatt for his coordination of the nomination and selection process and to the panel of judges who choose the recipients.

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Glossary



GLOSSARY

Calling and Ministry Studies (CAMS) – A program designed to assist applicants in identifying the divine call upon their lives and to explain to applicants the meaning and purposes of ministry. This four-month program consists of participation in three seminars, personal study in three CIMS courses, and three papers written by the applicants: (1) A paper on their calling into ministry; (2) A paper on their theology of ministry; and (3) A paper that summarizes their ministry identity. In the United States, CAMS is required before the applicant applies for the Exhorter credential.

Certificate In Ministerial Studies (CIMS) – A nontraditional ministerial training curriculum of 20 courses equaling 35 transferrable CIMS credits. This program of study provides introductory courses to prepare ministers for effective ministry, courses to explore Bible content, and courses to explain Evangelical and Pentecostal doctrine. The courses are delivered via DVD video lessons recorded by leading Church of God pastors and professors, with corresponding textbooks and student-oriented study guides.

Degree-Granting Institution – A degree-granting institution is one which offers college-level programs of study leading to a baccalaureate degree or its equivalent. This normally requires 120 semester credits with a general education core and a major area of study.

Denominational Certification – A set of procedures provided by the Division of Education which will enable each institution to ascertain the educational level of the school.

Distance Learning Centers – A Distance Learning Center (DLC) is a meeting site within the United States for students enrolled in CIMS classes.

Introduction

Distance Learning – A training model that brings its training directly to the student on the field instead of requiring the student to attend class in a traditional campus setting. This method incorporates education by extension, internships, correspondence courses, electronically enhanced learning, field courses, and universities and seminaries without walls.

Field-Area School – The major undergraduate-level school in each Church of God World Missions field area now offering master's degrees.

Governing Board – The governing board of an individual educational institution or agency (known variously as Board of Directors, Board of Trustees, Board of Education) appointed by the designated authority and having direct control over the policies of the institution or agency, as defined in its governing document and in conformity with the polity of the *Church of God Minutes* and the Mater Plan of Education.

Graduate Degree-Granting Institution – A graduate degree-granting institution is a college, seminary, or university, offering postgraduate programs of study leading to a master of arts, master of science, master of divinity, or doctor of ministry degree.

International Education System – World Missions has designated certain schools as premier field-area institutions. Each of these schools is accredited in its country of origin and is considered a college/graduate level education institution. Other schools that offer Bible institute and undergraduate training are strategically placed around the world.

International Learning Centers – An International Learning Center (ILC) is a meeting site outside the United States for students enrolled in CIMS classes.

Lee University Division of Adult Learning – The Division of Adult Learning uses a nontraditional approach that functions through online discussion, personal reflection, case studies, and text-driven contemplation. Highly qualified Lee University professors lead online and onsite courses that stimulate students' intellectual growth, promote their spiritual development, and equip them for professional success. Courses are offered fully online, in an intensive format (hybrid online and onsite mix), or fully onsite at Lee University education centers.

Level of Certification – Four levels are possible: (1) Christian service school, (II) Bible institute, (III) degree-granting institution, and (IV) graduate degree-granting institution.

Master Plan of Education – A statement identifying the philosophy, purposes, objectives, structure, standards, and goals for the Church of God education agencies, institutions, and programs.

Ministerial Development Board – A board appointed by the appropriate authority, having the responsibility to implement and supervise denominational programs of education at the national, territorial, regional, or state level.

Ministerial Internship Program (MIP) – A nine-month program designed for in-service training for ministers. The MIP includes on-the-job practical training through an internship with a pastor, seminars that provide instruction in ministerial principles, and group study with four CIMS courses. In the United States, MIP is required for advancement from the Exhorter credential to the Ordained Minister credential.

Introduction

MOBILIZE – A mentoring program that establishes a bond of loyalty and a relationship of cooperation between the pastor and members. It is a pastor's tool for motivating and training members for spiritual leadership and ministry together. Level I provides daily readings in leadership books, written seminars for the local pastor to share with the participants, and structured learning experiences which concentrate on character formation and leadership principles. Level II provides the participant an opportunity to choose a particular ministry area to study, such as cell-group ministry, women's ministry, children's ministry, and so forth.

National School – An institution in a country or territory outside the United States and Canada sponsored by the national church leadership and organized primarily for the purpose of training church workers in its geographic area, generally operated at the level of a Bible institute or a Bible school.

School of Ministry – The School of Ministry (SOM) is a nontraditional education initiative, created to serve ministers and laity who may not have had an opportunity to attend college or seminary, but who have a strong desire, based on a call of God, to minister within the church and larger community. The SOM functions as a department of the Church of God Division of Education under the General Board of Education at the direction of the executive director.

USA/Canada Education System – The institutions and their extension campuses that provide undergraduate and graduate-level studies in the United States and Canada are: (1) Lee University; (2) Pentecostal Theological Seminary; and (3) Hispanic Educational Ministries.

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
